MINUTES

1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Goode called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

2. INTRODUCTIONS / ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mayor Pro Tem Cantelme announced that the city's new appointment-based bulk trash pickup program will be available beginning June 2, 2025. Residents can register online at prescottrecycles.com for information. She added that the Council Subcommittee on Appointments is currently seeking applications for the Building Safety Advisory & Appeals Board, the Fire Board of Appeals, and the Tourism Advisory Committee. The filing deadline is Friday, May 30 at 5 pm. For more information contact the City Clerk's Office at 928-777-1437.

6. PRESENTATIONS

A. Annual Update & Presentation from Yavapai College.

Vice President of Community Relations Rodney Jenkins showed a video about Yavapai College and provided a presentation to the Council regarding what has been happening at Yavapai College over the last year. The university is a comprehensive community college with five bachelor's programs and they plan to add one new each year at a significantly lower cost than universities in the state (6x more). 96% of graduates stay in the County after graduation.

Councilman Montoya thanked Rodney for his presentation. It is easy for long-time residents to miss how comprehensive the offerings have become over the

last several years.

Councilman Gambogi concurred.

Mayor Goode echoed the comments and added that the expanded academic programs make this an asset to the community.

B. Presentation for 2024 Wreaths Across America.

Representative John Moffitt provided a presentation to the Council regarding the 2024 Wreaths Across America. They work with the American Legion, Gold Star Mothers and the City of Prescott, among others. The group placed over 3,100 wreaths in December 2024. Mr. Moffitt presented a certificate of appreciation to the city for their support and fee waivers for disposal fees.

C. Presentation to 2024 Firefighter of the Year, Jordan Pluimer, and 2024 Paramedic of the Year, Robert Frias.

Fire Chief Holger Durre provided a presentation to the 2024 Firefighter and Paramedic of the year and read the nomination statements.

7. PROCLAMATIONS

A. National Police Week - May 12-18

Mayor Goode presented the Proclamation.

8. OPEN CALL TO THE PUBLIC

A. Louise Parker-Trengove addressed the Council regarding loud vehicles in the downtown parking garage, which is creating an issue not only because of the noise but because of safety. This is an ongoing issue that seems to never stop.

B. James Knaup addressed the Council regarding "ride to city hall" on Friday May 16th. It is a wonderful time of year and the day to ride around Prescott.

C. Cathey Rusing addressed the Council regarding the new General Plan future land use map and a major change that she feels warrants a discussion. There are additional growth corridors in the map that have been added and this is of no benefit to the city.

D. David Segall addressed the Council regarding the Whiskey Off-Road event, and the city should stop acting like a revolving door for free loans. He is in favor of the event, but to say it is a win/win/win that is incorrect, it is a lose for those who do not have businesses and don't get a benefit from tourism.

9. CONSENT AGENDA

MOTION BY COUNCILMAN MONTTOYA TO APPROVE CONSENT AGENDA ITEMS 9.A. THROUGH 9.I., EXCLUDING ITEM 9.C.; SECONDED BY MAYOR PRO TEM CANTELME: PASSED (5 - 0)

- A. Approval of Meeting Minutes from the April 8, 2025 Executive Session, the April 8, 2025 Study Session, the April 8, 2025 Voting Meeting and the May 6, 2025 Special Executive Session.
- B. Adoption of Resolution No. 2025-1924 Approving City Contract No. 2019-229A2, an Amendment to City Contract No. 2019-229, an Intergovernmental Agreement Between the City of Prescott and Yavapai County for Consolidated Court Operations.
- C. Approval of City Contract No. 2025-155 with Born To Be Wild Adventures Tours & Rentals, LLC, for Boat Rental Concessions at Watson and Goldwater Lakes for a Concession Fee of 10% of Gross Revenue from All Rentals Paid Monthly to the City of Prescott.

Councilman Moore pulled this Item from the Consent Agenda for further discussion. He stated that he felt after listening to the person who had held the contract for the last several years the vote should be postponed. He has concerns about the bidding process and feels that the new Recreation Services Director should be involved in selecting the contractor.

Deputy Recreation Services Director Tim Legler responded with a review of the procurement process. The existing contract has already been extended once and expires in July. The RFP was published with a pre-proposal meeting and bids opened March 6. The review committee consisted of staff from varying departments and they reviewed the RFP qualifications and tabulated the proposals. This contract is providing a service to the public and there is a 10% gross that the city gets back which isn't being adjusted.

Councilman Montoya asked about the bid and scoring process and whether there was a rubric which laid out how to score and if the contract was awarded based on that process. He added that he finds it irregular that the Council would override that process.

City Attorney Joseph Young responded that there was a specific process and that the rules were followed. The decision on who the city contracts with is up to the Council but to the extent that the answer is no to the way the process was conducted, then they would need to start over.

Councilman Gambogi asked how many departments were on the review committee for this process.

Mr. Legler responded that there were three departments involved, and reviewed the evaluation criteria.

Councilman Moore asked about Born to be Wild renting kayaks at the lake without a contract.

Mr. Young stated that there was no exclusivity in the existing contract and that Born to Be Wild paid for a Special Use Permit.

Mayor Goode said it all depends on the terms of the contract, and added that when he reviewed the process he felt that it was fair, but his concern now is that if not all of the raters were thorough and completed their review and if that is the case, then there is a problem.

Councilman Montoya commented that the level of micromanagement on this is beyond him. There was a process and outside a fourth reviewer not completing responses, there is nothing else that would be relevant to the approval of a contract.

Councilman Moore said that if there was a process in place and one person did not participate then it skewed the results.

Mayor Pro Tem Cantelme commented that she has looked into this and there have been a lot of claims that need to be aired out and she feels a policy needs to be adopted.

Mr. Legler responded that the RFP just stated that there would be scoring criteria and that it would be complete.

Member of the public Matthew Mortiz addressed the Council regarding his contract which is valid through July 2025. He said that he is asking for transparency and feels that is lacking. He alleged that the City Manager will not speak to them, and the competitive process for this has not been followed and requested that a vote on this item be postponed.

Member of the public David Wheeler addressed the Council as former owner of Prescott Outdoors from 2008-2020. He stated that the company has contributed over a quarter of a million dollars to this community and this process has not been fair.

Member of the public Cathey Rusing addressed the Council and stated that this is a generic service provider contract and not a concessionaire contract which is what it should be. She added that there should be exclusivity clauses included.

Member of the public Francesca DeParis addressed the Council regarding the lack of accountability for certain individuals over the last seven years, and the fact that the Council is considering awarding a contract to a person who has been dishonest and is breaking the law is not good.

Member of the public Joshua Haug addressed the Council regarding the slander happening against Maryah Dilbeck is wrong.

Member of the public Maryah Dilbeck addressed the Council regarding the permission she has had to operate from Recreation Services in 2018 and that she is able to provide a letter stating such. She added that the allegations being made against her are hurtful and untrue.

Councilman Gambogi said that name-calling is not appropriate for a City Council

meeting, the number difference was significant and some of the Council members are dealing with conjecture when they should be dealing with the facts.

Member of the public Jeff Drew addressed the Council regarding issues he has had with Prescott Outdoors that nearly led to a physical fight. He also has an issue with Born to Be Wild and said that there is an overall lack of respect for fisherman at the lake. He thinks the contract needs to be rewritten.

Councilman Montoya commented that if this is postponed it sends a dangerous message in setting a precedent to postpone a vote on something because they get enough people in room, and if the Council breaks the bid process as a city that is bad.

Mayor Goode echoed comments from Councilman Montoya. He stated that if bids are fairly evaluated, that is what the Council needs to rely on, however, in this case he feels the process was flawed. There should be a clear and fair way of evaluating the bids.

City Clerk Sarah Siep and Mr. Young stated that staff needs a clear motion from Council if they decide to postpone voting on this matter and if they simply want more information or if they are planning to start the process over.

Mr. Moritz said Addendum 1 is not included in the contract to be voted on today, that addendum is unclear and inaccurate. He wants clarity on whether they have a Special Events Permit or a Special Use Permit. Requested a cease and desist if the codes are not being followed properly.

Mr. Legler stated that the Addendum is part of the bid packet and not the contract.

11. LIQUOR LICENSE

- A. Public Hearing and Consideration for a New Series 10 Beer & Wine Store Liquor License Application from Perry Charles Huellmantel, Applicant, for QuikTrip #1548 (QuikTrip Corporation). Location: 2292 E State Route 69.

City Clerk Sarah Siep reminded the Council that their action today is making a recommendation to the Department of Liquor License & Control who will ultimately approve or deny the license application.

Member of the public Karen Monks addressed the Council as representative for the Prescott Canyon Estates HOA. She stated that granting the liquor license will attract homeless to the area, it will also disrupt the area with noise and traffic, there are enough liquor licenses in the area already and the tribe is building a traffic center that will most likely have liquor as well. The neighborhood doesn't want this in their community.

Member of the public Susan Perkins addressed the Council as a resident of Prescott Canyon Estates. She realizes change is coming, but she wishes that people would care about the well-being of others. She is distressed that the QuikTrip was approved at all and this additional item for the QuikTrip is not

necessary.

Applicant Representative Lauren Proper-Potter addressed the Council regarding the request for a recommendation to the DLLC regarding the Series 10, which is for package beer and wine sales. There are two statutory requirements, first that they are capable/reliable and this applicant has served on the board in the past so he meets that qualification. Additionally, they meet the "best interest" qualification because it serves as a convenience market for the community.

Mayor Goode reviewed requirements for consideration of a liquor license and added that the governing body's recommendation goes to the DLLC for their action.

Councilman Moore asked about the hours of operation.

Ms. Proper-Potter responded that it will be 24 hours, and added that QuikTrip is committed to keeping the space clean and its employees are its largest owner.

Councilman Montoya asked if the Council has ever denied a license or if the DLLC would deny it.

Ms. Siep responded that the Council makes the recommendation to the DLLC for approval or denial, and added that in her time at the city the Council has never recommended denial.

12. REGULAR AGENDA

- A. Adoption of Resolution No. 2025-1921 (GPA24-001) & Ordinance No. 2025-1891 (REZ24-003) A Request for a Rezoning from SF-9 (Single Family) to MF-H (Multi Family - High Density) and a Minor General Plan Amendment from Low-Medium Residential to Medium-High Residential on a Total of 0.6 Acres with an Overall Project Area of 3.279 Acres, for a Proposed 106 Unit Apartment Complex. Community Planner Tammy Dewitt provided a presentation to the Council regarding the rezoning of 0.6 acres. The current zoning is SF-9 and the surrounding zoning is MFH to the north/west/south. This item also approves a minor general plan amendment, and since the April 8 Council meeting the proposed senior units have been removed, the building on the southern portion of the east parcel removed and units have been dispersed to other buildings making all three-stories in height. The proposal has the required amount of parking.

Councilman Gambogi asked how many units and parking spaces there were before and how many there are now.

Ms. Dewitt stated that there have always been 106-units, and added that the previous proposal had 153 spaces and this one has 180 spaces.

Mayor Pro Tem Cantelme if this meets the Land Development Code (LDC) requirements for parking.

Ms. Dewitt confirmed that it does.

Councilman Moore commented that the lack of parking was the primary issue at the last meeting which was addressed. Since the last meeting, he has received correspondence regarding the buildings not becoming three story, but there are still 106-units and have addressed the parking issue. He added that the removal of the building at the south end of the property should alleviate many of the view impacts which would have impacted surrounding homeowners.

Mayor Goode echoed Councilman Moore's comments. He has listened to proposals for all kinds of things for that property and nothing has been done, so this will be valuable for the area.

Member of the public Don Swetlik addressed the Council regarding the scope of the project which have been the issues of the community. He read from minutes from a previous Planning & Zoning Commission Meeting, there are a number of multi-family units in the area, but they are not three stories. He encouraged the Council to deny the rezoning.

Member of the public Alan Sargeant addressed the Council regarding a tree that is sitting on the property. He appreciates how the homes/structures fit into the natural environment. This project poorly generates a sense of identity to the surrounding area.

Member of the public Zachary Fitzsimmons addressed the Council as a renter in the community. He was concerned and disappointed that a vote about fixing an existing zoning issues turned into a discussion about parking and the look of the development. The Council needs to have more sense of urgency in having these types of developments put in when there has been a 40% increase in the average cost of housing over the last several years with no increase in household income.

Member of the public Megan Henwood addressed the Council regarding the many questions they have been asked to answer regarding this project, when the only one is to determine whether it makes sense that a parcel surrounded by multifamily be zoned single family. the logical notion is to vote in favor of rezoning.

Member of the public Darryl Ivan Brown addressed the Council regarding how engaging this meeting has been and as a resident who is adjacent to this property to the south in a single family home. He is not opposed to this development, the community needs more housing downtown, and he appreciates that the new site plan addresses the parking issue but feels it is topographically impossible to accomplish. Wants the community assured that they are getting what they want in an appropriate way.

Mayor Goode asked staff to address the sloping issue raised.

Public Works Director Gwen Rowitsch responded that it will be required to meet the standards for parking. There is often a lot of grading that needs to be done for these types of projects, which will be addressed throughout the process.

Member of the public Veronica Grace addressed the Council as a neighbor to the site and owner of rental properties surrounding it. She supports the development of this site and high density housing in the area, but believes that code needs to be looked at. Everything has to be met. She agrees that the topography doesn't allow for what they are proposing and other areas are non-conforming. Not complying with hillside standards.

Member of the public Jeff Falls addressed the Council in support of the project and echoed the comments of young people who have spoken to Council. This is something the community needs.

Member of the public Lenora Bateman (Sandy Griffis read a message on her behalf) in support of the project. As a member of the neighborhood and someone interested in the vitality of this community this project will help meet these needs. It is smart infill development that builds on existing infrastructure. Encouraged the Council to look at the bigger picture.

Member of the public Michael Enders addressed the Council in support of this project and encouraged the Council to approve.

Member of the public Sandy Griffis addressed the Council expressing her strong support for this project, which addressed growing demand for affordable housing. It is thoughtfully designed and provides units that are needed. Aligns well with Prescott's commitment to sustainable growth.

Member of the public Jonathan Aten addressed the Council regarding the need for housing in Prescott. Emotion should be taken out of this process and approve a rezoning that meets city guidelines and codes.

Member of the public Marti Verrier addressed the Council regarding the narrow

dead-end street, and she doesn't know how, in case of an emergency, that wouldn't create a problem. She wants something that will fit in with the community, and she is concerned with the grading and how negative it will be for the surrounding neighbors.

Member of the public Alvin Burke addressed the Council regarding the neighborhood's concerns regarding the project and stated that they don't have an issue with the apartments themselves. People living in these apartments will be walking to their place of employment and not walking, so traffic will definitely be an issue.

Councilman Moore thanked speakers Zach and Megan. The issue today is a rezoning, it isn't about parking or traffic studies/hillsides. The Council and public have been off-topic for an hour and the goal post keeps getting moved as it relates to this project.

Councilman Montoya echoed Councilman Moore's comments.

Mayor Pro Tem Cantelme disagreed with Councilman Moore's comments. In order to pass this she wants compliance with the code. She asked the architect to address the mountainside. She asked staff to address the traffic impact analysis included in the agenda packet. She is not in favor of having the codes not be followed.

Michael Taylor Architect responded that there is no topographic map yet, the hillside ordinance all has to be met and will be looked at during the plan review.

Community Development Director Chelsea Walton stated that the city's Traffic Engineer did look at and comment regarding whether an analysis was warranted and determined that the figures were well below the 100 peak hour thresholds outlined in the LDC. She also addressed concerns regarding parking in the rear versus in the front and discretion regarding the proposed site and surroundings. It all comes with looking at the site in total (GES, LDC etc) are all part of the review.

Mr. Taylor added that the site plan has parking facing all the other parking and not adjacent to the homes in the surrounding area.

- B. **WSA25-009:** A Water Service Application for 13.24 Acre-feet Per Year Submitted by Michael Taylor Architects, on Behalf of Owner YH Development Properties, LLC. Location: APN 109-13-001D, 500 S Marina St., 8 Parcels Comprising 3.5 Acres.

Water Resource & Environmental Services Manager Brian Ruiz provided a presentation to the Council regarding the water service application for the 106-unit multifamily apartment complex. The applicant provided a demand analysis for the project and the use of 0.12/each unit, putting the total project at 13.24 AF

including landscaping at the site. The applicant has requested an appeal of the 50% rule for this project, available is 19.5 AF in the residential budget, a letter of appeal is included in the packet.

Mayor Goode stated that this is minor considering that half would only be approximately 8 AF.

- C. Adoption of Resolution No. 2025-1923 Approving Updates to the Water Management Policy Related to Hazardous Materials & Pollutant Discharge.

Water Resource & Environmental Services Manager Brian Ruiz provided a presentation to Council regarding a request from the Water Issues Subcommittee to update the Water Management Policy and water service applications. Staff looked at the city's pre-treatment and MS4 programs to come up with proposed language and modifications to the policy.

Wastewater PreTreatment Program:

- * Prevent discharge of pollutants that could disrupt wastewater treatment processes, cause operational issues or result in violations of discharge into the city's wastewater treatment facilities
- * Ensure harmful substances do not bypass treatment and enter surface waters or the groundwater aquifer
- * Reduce exposure to toxic substances and ensure the safety of those working in the wastewater treatment facilities

Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Program:

- * Reduce discharge of pollutants to the maximum extent practicable
- * Protect water quality
- * Satisfy the appropriate water quality requirements of the Clean Water Act

Mr. Ruiz covered the revisions to Section 3c of the Water Management Policy related to Wastewater Collection and Treatment; Section 3d related to Stormwater; Section 5a1 Applying for Water Service; and the updated the application itself.

Mayor Goode asked if the city is already doing these analyses, and they are just being added to the policy at this point. He also asked what enforcement and penalties look like.

Mr. Ruiz confirmed, and added that this will determine if an application will need to comply with any additional standards and have an understanding of what may contribute to these programs. Each program has penalties and regulations for enforcement. He doesn't have that information offhand, but it is in code. Pre-treatment is under Water Operations and MS4 is under Environmental Services.

Public Works Director Gwen Rowitsch added that enforcement is done through the city code with either civil or criminal fines. They always attempt to get voluntary compliance and then seek the assistance of the city attorney's office.

They are currently seeking compliance from a manufacturer that routinely violates city code, and they are currently seeking criminal action against them.

Mayor Pro Tem Cantelme stated that she is happy to see this proposal and asked if it is something that ADEQ requires and if the city will be participating in the mitigation of these issues.

Ms. Rowitsch responded that it is, all ADEQ obligations are met in Chapter 2-1 of the City Code and has been in place since the late 1990s. When a new business comes in they have to go through permitting and these codes are applied and addressed. These regulations have been in place for over twenty years.

Councilman Moore asked if car washes fall under this as well.

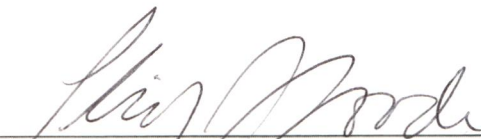
Mr. Ruiz confirmed, they have to go through pre-treatment application process.

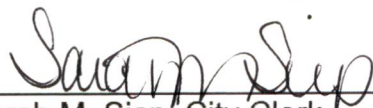
